# ASSEMBLY OF GENERALS - REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY, 1971

- 1. For SEDOS, the highlights of the year 1971 veres
- A new Executive Committees, including a new President Fr. Th. van Asten pa elected on February 1<, 1971.
- Five new members: SHCJ, SX, CSSp, CM, SDS.
- The round of informal meetings with Generalates: this provided important information for the nev/ Executive Committee, summed up in the consolidated report (SEDOS 71/459 ff).
- The staff of the Permanent Secretariat<sup>^</sup> by mid-year, was finally (and for the first time)"al complete": B. Tonna? Executive Secretary? Fr. L. Banot Fr. A. Ibba,
  Sr. Agnetta P. Assistants for Documentation; Miss A. Ashford, Mile. A.Fernandez,
  G. Tierney, Sig.na A. Trezzini Assistants for the Secretariat.
- The publication of the first edition of the Catholic Media Directory thanJcs to the guidance of the Social Communications Working Group, and to the work of Fr. R. Aguilb sj.
- The conclusion of the study on the effects of Nationalization of Schools in Africa, conducted by the Education Vforking Group, under Sr. M. Keenan rscm, Chairman.
- The two open meetings of the Health Group and its plans for a CIDSE/SEDOS Health Secretariat to promote cooperation between Catholics and the Christian Medical Council.
- The Urban Mission study initiated by the Development Working Group under Fr. V. Fecher svd, and the first fruits of the Misereor/SEDOS PDP; the, visit of Sr. Pilar, fresh from a post-graduate course in Education Planning at Harvard.
- The launching of the Formation Facilities file, under the direction of Fr. Ibba.
- The birth of an "Information Cooperative" to link up the information.sources of the Member Generalates.
- The initiation of a Community Card file, to answer with more precision the basic question "Who is doing what and where?".
- The budget, finally, in shape: SEDOS ends the year with a real, if slight, excess of expenditure over income.
- The first year of the widely-read SEDOS Quarterly, "Joint Venture", edited by Fr. P.P. Moody pa.
- 2. The Assembly and the Executive Committee met regularly and the weekly Documenta-Service appeared faithfully. In addition, the Secretariat also called the following meetings - in response to requests by Generalates:
  - "Common Services for Documentation and Information" (in English and French)
  - "Meeting of Assistants for East Asia"
  - "Islam Information et Echange sur la presence de L\*Eglise au monde Musulman"
  - "Communications Within Institutes"
  - "Iron Curtain Countries"
  - "Mass Media for the Missions"
  - "Are \Ie Meeting the Apostolic and Religious Needs in the USA?"
  - -"L'Africanisation des Structures de L\*Eglise Locale"/"L'Africanisation ou L\*Indigenisation"
  - "Formation of Missionary Priests" (English and French)
  - "Meeting of Documentalists"
  - "Brazil"
- 3. <u>Current Orientations</u> During the year, the interests of SEDOS tended to gravitate around the following major concerns:
  - The study **of new** areas **for** Mission: the cities **of** the Third Worlds China, what happens after the nationalization of schools, the population explosion,' social communications.

- The'focus of the Secretariat on the systematic collection and dissemination of information relevant to today's (and tomorrow's)Mission.
- Situation Reports in the V/eekiy Bulletin on current, common problems,
- The effort to bring together concerned and knov/ledgeable persons in order to mutually determine orientations on pressing issues -• especially through ad hoc meetings, followed up by the Secretariat - (i.e. see 2. above - in addition, Credit Unions, the WCC, etc.)
- The effort to improve the french side of SEDOS documentation activities.
- 4. <u>The Next Step.</u>; As we end 1971, we can suggest the follov/ing as objectives for 1972 s
- The consolidation of the "Information Cooperative".
- "Taking our bearings" on the values and trends (rather than on the details) of today's mission and handing on the message to the workers in the field.
- ~ The concentration on carefully selected missionary concerns; this should be our response to the sensible change in the Rome environments the example of SEDOS as a private group has been imitated and a number of parallel groups have been formed. These could take over some of the activities SEDOS had initiated (i.e., General Secretaries, Education, Agrimission etc.)
- The encouragement of the existing "Working Groups" to become "Study Groups". There is now a new; generation of members of Generalates, and the formula of the "permanent" V/orking Groups seems to be losing its appeal. The groups could initiate and guide specific studies (e.g. Development Working Group).
- The rethinling of our relationship with other agencies on the basis of our experience vdth the.CMC and with Misereor. We should clarify the idea of "working with, but not for them".

- a) "If we ran into financial difficulties, how many copies would you take at ^fl.00 per year (4 copies)?"
- b) "If we produce an edition in Dutch, how many copies would you take?"

# THE SITUATION - ANALYSIS OF SURVEY ON ORGANIZATION OF INFORMATION IN THE GENERAL HOUSES OF SEDOS MEMBERS - conducted by the SEDOS Social Cojnmunications Work Group

This survey was undertaken - by means of a questionnaire sent out in March '71 - with a view to giving a general idea of the scope nnd organization of internal comminications in the generalates of SEDOS Member congregations. The response to the questionnaire was excellent c A total of 36 congregations - at that time the total SEDOS membership - sent in replies.

From these it was seen that all but two congreg'itions - the Xaverian Brothers and the Columban Fathers - publish an <u>internal Society Bulletin</u> Two bulletins appear twice monthly; fifteen appear monthly; thirteen appear less than once monthly but at regular intervals and four appear at irregular intervals.

All congregations seem to have some sort of information service. The way this is organized in each congregation is, however, quite different!

- 13 congregations handled information through an information service at the Generalate
- 23 congregations handled information through the general council or generalate staff
- In  $17\ \text{congregations}$  the publication staff is the same as for the general secretariate
- In 4 congregitions the publication staff is the general council
- In 13 congregations there is a special editorial staff for information and news seEvice.

<u>Languages</u>; ~ The 34 congregations publishing an internal Society Bulletin bring out  $\overline{78}$  editions, the main languages being English, French and Spanish.

It seemed best *t6* organize the bulk of the attached information in statistical form. A special enclosure has been made giving details of how communications information is handled by the various Generalates - who is responsible for the material handled<sup>^</sup> how it is handled, printing information and other relevant details contained in the<sup>^</sup> replies to the questionnaires. Nearly all congregations publish one or more of the following <u>besides</u> their internal bulletins- general letters, statistical reports, personnel lists, directories, general dociMientation etc. This information has <u>not</u> been detailed in the statistical sheet-

## Conclusions

My conclusion from re-^ding these questionnaires would be in the form of a question or two:

- In wh.-^t way could SEDOS members cooperate more fully in this field of internal communications?
- Where is there a need to be met by the SEDOS Communications Work Group?

The follov/ing information, extracted from the body of the questionnaires which were returned, gives an overall picture of the way communications are handled in the various Generalates belonging to SEDOS.

# Missionary Sisters of Our Lady of Africa (\?hite Sisters)

Information is handled through the General Council, General Secretariate and Secretariate for Information. Circular letters or official documents emanating from the General Council and all other publications are submitted to the General Council for approval of subject matter and judgement as to the most suitable time for publication of the material. The Secretariate for Information, staffed by two full-time and one half-time \;orlcers (Sisters) is responsible for the composition, translation and typing of textsj typing to offset plates is done by the General Secretariate (two Sisters) and mailing is effected by four Sisters – two from the Secretariate for Information and two from the General Secretariate, if this is foxmd necessary.

Grass roots information for the production of texts comes from the 15 provinces of the congregation, each of v/hich produces a provincial nev's bulletin, tv/o copies of v/hich are sent to the central level.

## School Sisters of Notre Dame

The Generalate staff is responsible for the handling of information. The usual procedure is to send all matter to be printed in English to the printing house located in V/isconsin, USA (staff of SSND printers and dispatchers) for printing and mailing to the 647 houses in North America and to foundations in Central and South America, Guam, Japan and Liberia. All copy to be printed in German is sent to a printing house in Munich and from there is distributed to the 254 houses in Germany and Austria. One copy is sent to each Provincial house in Italy. At these Provincial houses, the **circLilar** or other communication is translated into Italian, Polish, Slovenian, Portuguese, etc. for distribution to houses in these particular provinces.

## Missionary Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary ("ICM)

Information comes from district correspondents and through the district .teams (government), and is processed by the Generalate team at central level for the bulletin and directory v/hich the congregation produces.

# Missionary Sisters Servants of the Holy Spirit

Information is handled by the General Secretariate — the Secretary General and Editor of Information Service. This information consists of official communications, news bulletins, obituaries and informal communications. Official communications only are printed — at the provincial house printers in Germany; mimeographing is done at the Generalate. External communications are taken care of by the individual provinces (3 German-speaking provinces produce"SEIN AUFTRAG"; 3 Spanish-speaking provinces in Argentina .combine with other missionary congregations in putting out a magazine; provinces and regions in the US, Philippines, Switzerland, and Austria have their own individual magazines).

#### Society of the Sacred Heart

The Central Team (comprised of the Superior General and 4 Councillors), handles information at the general house. Those Sisters in the secretariate are responsible for the production of information — circular letters, information bulletin, etc. No one person is responsible (i.e. no one person has a specific task) but all collaborate.

In the near future, it is hoped to establish a Communications Team who will be v/orking at the Centre (NB: the questionnaire v/as completed on June 4, 1971-it is not known v/hether this communication team has yet been set up).

## Sisters of Notre Dame dc Namur

Formerly, information v/as handled by the General Councillor, appointed Chairman of Communications – this v/as to be expanded to a team approach as of July, 1971.

The-organization of production of the material v/hich is supplied by a Communications Chairman from each province consists of both Sisters and outsiders. All staff in the secretarial organization is part time and includes one editor, 5 translators, 1 typist, and 2 dispatchers.

### Medical Mission Sisters

Information is handled through the Sister in charge of Central Communications. The Sister is employed full time with communications and editing of the central bulletin; she does the translating and typing of the bulletin into a second language and is • assisted by a typist and printer/dispatcher. Publications from the central level including general letters, popular reports, statistical information and bulletin are sent only to the Sisters, but much of the content is" used for external publication since the Sisters are free to quote from them - especially from the "SMM-Intercontinent" (internal bulletin), v/ork statistics and popular reports.

## Sainte Famille de Bordeaux

The Superioress General, the Secretary General and a team of General Councillors handle all information. There is no CommiAnications Secretariate - the v/ork is handled by the Secretary General.

## Sacred Heart of Mary - Marymount

The Communications Office and General Secretariate handle information. T\70 people work full time in communications with the help of one clerical helper (lay). The two offices, i.e. coinmunications and secretariate, arc separate entities.

# Franciscan Missionaries of Mary

A Central Bureau of Information, subdivision of the General Secretariate, is responsible for information-sharing.

The first monthly nev;s bulletin for the entire community v/as due in October, 1971 - one English-speaking person is involved and a French counterpart is being sought. There is a clerk v/orking in documentation, but a trained documentalist is being prepared,

### Chanoinesses de St. Augustin

The General Secretariate is responsible for the handling of all information. Personnel include: secretary general, assistant and translating assistant, typist and dispatcher, of which the first tv/o mentioned arc full-time.

### Society of the Holy Child Jesus

One Councillor is responsible for communications. There is a simple commimications system; each province circulates a ncv/s bulletin; one Sister in the US and one in England work full-time in communications in the provinces.

# Sisters of Charity - Tilburg

One of the members of the General Board is the head of the Communications System created by the general chapter of 1969-70.

Each province/ region of the congregation has its ov/n Communications- System, according to the needs of the country. One Sister is in charge of this national system. All these national communication persons together, form the International Communication Commission (iCC).

### SEDOS

The intention of this communication system is not to give information, but to influence the mentality of the Sisters in the Province/Region —.nd to build up relations.

The congregation correspondent is in charge of the v/ritten communication, information, documentation, and v/ritten dialogue botv,':ien the Sisters on an international level. She is the Editor of the congregational contact paper.

Some publications are printed outside - preparatory work for this being done by the secretariate staffed by 3: ?. secretaries and 1 typist.

The Editor of the congregational contact paper is independent of the secretariate. She has a part-time assistant. A translator v/orks part-time for the translation of Dutch into English.

### Ursulines of the Roman Union

Information is handled by Superior General, Assistant and OCEA Office (Central Office for Education/Apostolate).

So far, no real center for documentation/information has boon established, but plans are being examined for the possibility of establishing a <u>communications office</u>.

### Maryknoll Sisters of St. Dominic

Information handling: Central Governing Board and/or through the President of Central Governing Board. Editorial work, typing, printing, documentation, etc. is done on a part-time basis by a department responsible for the publication at hand — shared by various central departments according to material being published.

### Scheut Missionaries (GICM)

Information handling: Social Communications Service – subdivision of the General Secretariate. Staff consists of 1 Editor/Director, full-time, 1 lay typist, 1 documentalist/archivist and 1 lay printer.

## Carmelites

CITOC (Communications Center with 2 Fathers in charge) and Institututum Carmelitanum (scientific) with 1 full-time and 7 part-time Fathers, handle information.

# SMA

Central Secretariate handles information. Editing, translating, typing documentation, printing and dispatching of communications — including ncv/slettcr, bulletin and society personnel and statistics — is done by 4 full-time priest members of the Secretariate and 1 lay typist.

#### V/hitc Fathers

General Secretariate is responsible for information — one publication only — "Petit Echo", v/hich is the official bulletin of the Society, an organ of information and a means of commimication for Ifnite Fathers in the Provinces and in Africa who write articles for it. Staff: Editorial - V, Translating - 1; Typist - 1• and Printer - 1 (outsider).

# Pont. Inst. Missioni Estere (PIME) "

General Secretariate responsible for information handling. Editorial staff consists of one priest full-time and another part-time, 1 part-time translator, 1 typist, 1 documentalist, 1 part-time printer and 1 part-time dispatcher. Typists are occasionally used from 'outside'. For the "AKNUARIO" and "IL VIHCOLO" (official booklet and official magazine) printing is done at the Society's printing house in Milan.

## Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate

Has an Information Service with Director and staff of 4 Editors'. 'The translating and editorial work is done by the same people. Outside translators are occasionally ... me employed.

The remaining staff consists of 1 printer, full-time and 1 part-time, and 1 full-time and 2 part-time dispatchers.

Publications issued from the OMI Information Service have no official character. Official documents are under the General Secretary: circular letters of the General.

The OMI Information Service is a department of the Secretariate of Social Communications The Assistant Secretary of the latter is at the same tim.e Director of the Information Service.

# Missionaries of the Sacred Heart

Information handling is done by the General Secretariate. Editorial staff consists of 2 full-time priests; translators include 2 part-time priests and 1 part-time outsider; 2 typists, 1 full and 1 part-time; 2 documentalists, 1 full and 1 part-time; 1 parttime printer; 1 part-time dispatcher and 3 'others\*.

<u>Pia Societa di S. Francesco Saverio per le Missioni Estere (Xavarian Missionaries)</u> Staff consists of one part-time Editor, 1 typist (full-time) and one part-time printer

#### Society of Mary (Marianists)

Secretary General is responsible for the handling of information. Staff consists of 1 part-time Editor, 3 part-time translators and typists.

### Society of Jesus

Information is handled through Press Office - Ufficio Stampa, General Secretariate, and Specialized Secretariates. Organization of Secretariate consists of 2 Editors full-time and 4 part-time; 1 full-time translator priest; 5 part-time priests and 1 outsider; 1 full-time and 5 part-time typists; 1 full-time and 1 part-time printer and 3 part-time dispatchers.

# \_3rothers of the Christian Schools

Information is handled through General Secretariate and Curia Generalizia. Total of 12 full-time workers in the Secretariate organization: 1 Editor, 5 typists, 5 documentalists, 1 printer. Part-time staff consists of 3 editorial workers, 6 translators, 1 typist, 1 documentalist, 1 dispatcher. In addition, 2 outside translators and 2 typists arc employed.

### Comboniani (Verona Fathers

Staff (all part-time) for the various publications consists of 3 Editors, 3 translators 2 typists, 1 documentalist, 1 printer and 1 dispatcher.

Printings and mailings of the various publications are done either from the Rome house (cyclo) or from the printer in Verona at the mother house.

# Divine Word Missionaries ( SVD)

Department of Social Communications handles all information. Editorial staff consists of 3 part-time, 3 full-time priests andl outsider. Typists number: 1 full-time and 3 part-time. Printer: 1 part-time, and 2 part-time dispatchers.

# Congregation of the Holy Ghost

Information handled through information/Documentation Center (I Secretary for Information, 1 Secretarv for Documentation), These are responsible for most of the work translating, documenting, typing, etc. Some help is given on a part-time basis by others.

Marianhill Fathers

Numbers: 1 part-time Editor; 1 part-time translator; 1 part-time printer; and 1 part-time dispatcher - all members of the General Council.

### Xaverian Brothers

The General Council is responsible for information handling v/hich is done only through Circular Letters in English and Dutch (i.e. no bulletin). The General Council does all the practical work involved in this - translating, editing, printing, etc.

# Congregation of the Mission

General Secretariate – Secretary General – is responsible for information. Editorial staff for the communications issued consists of 1 full-time and T part-time Editor; translators arc confreres at both curial and provincial level who also do the typing; printers number: 2 nart-timo; and there is one part-time dispatcher.

## Maryknoll Fathers

Superior General down through Council members are responsible for information handling\* One bulletin (monthly) only is issued. Staff is listed as 1 full-time typist-clerk and 3 secretaries (all full-time).

## Missions Etrangeres de Paris

Information Service and Service for Ongoing Formation responsible for information. Staff: 5 full-time Editorial and 4 full-time typists.

# Society of St. Columban

For the snoment (i.e. March/^pcil when questionnaire was completed), the Central Administration handles information until the appointment of an Information Officer.

There is no internal society bulletin. They publish "THE FAR EAST" in Ireland and Australia and "COLUMBAN FATHERS REYIEVf in the U.S. - both for extra publication. Each home region in the Society has its magazine - i.e. Ireland, USA and Australia.

# St. Joseph's Missionary Society of Mill Hill

Secretariate General handles information. There is a Secretary General with one assistant, who work full-time for all commmications - directories, central news-letters, circular letters, etc., helped occasionally by 'kind hands' of cooperators.
