

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

A meeting of the Executive Committee of SEDOS was held on March 16, 1972 at 4:00 p.m. at the Secretariate. The following were present: Sr. M. Th. Barnett scmm-t, Bro. P.M. Basterrechea fsc (for Bro. C.H. Buttmer), Sr. A. M. de Vreede scmm-m (for Sr. Jane Gates), Fr. W. Goossens cicm, Sr. M. Danita McGonagle ssnd, and Bro. G. Schnepf sm.

1. The Minutes of the last meeting (21 February 1972, SEDOS 72/142ff) were read with the following comment:

a) SEDOS 72/142, Item 3,: The "sending" and "receiving" Churches should receive different treatment.

2. Agenda Item 1: (SEDOS 72/185) - Quarterly Report of the Executive Secretary (SEE APPENDIX "A") : Fr. Tonna highlighted the two main concentrations of effort by the Secretariat:

a) Servicing the (3) studies undertaken by the Sedos Group ("The Role of the Overseas Missionary in the Local Church", "The Urban Mission", and The Survey and Evaluation of the Mission Today).

b) Refining the system of supplying the Generalates the information they really need.

The Executive Committee made the following observations on the report:

- It would be useful to convoke an assembly at the SVD Generalate in order to give members a direct introduction to the system of documentation as it now exists. This would also encourage the Generalates -- especially the Councils -- to use it more frequently. In the meantime, the Secretariat would concentrate on providing information as requested by using the same system.

- The usefulness of the Community Card File was reconsidered, and it was agreed that there was no special need to provide some of the details -- such as the name of the local Superior which changes frequently. However, it was very useful to have at least the addresses and the list of activities of each of our member Institutes' commitments.

- Re 4.iii) (APPENDIX "A"), Sr. Danita and Fr. Tonna communicated to the Executive Committee the following conclusions of the Development Working Group on the project of sponsoring an evening course in coop praxis for ecclesiastical students in Rome:

(1) Sedos could morally sponsor the project on the conditions that

- it does not draw people from the Third World to Rome, but focuses on the Third World people already here.
- these people be trained to reinforce initiatives of this type in the Third World itself.
- a Sedos representative sit on its Board.

It was noted that since Propaganda Fide and a Rome University were practically assured as sponsors -- and after carefully considering the conclusions of the group -- it was agreed that there would be no point in Sedos officially assuming this role.

- It was also agreed that membership of the Working Groups should be restricted to persons representing the Generalates rather than other organizations.

- Re Social Communications Working Group - It was with sincere regret that the Executive Committee noted the resignation of Fr. Périgny as Chairman of this group, and appreciation was expressed for the valuable contributions he has made. The Group will be asked to meet soon in order to elect a new Chairman.

The Executive Secretary's Report was then accepted.

3. Agenda Item 2: The Study on "The Role of the Overseas Missionary in the Local Church"

a) It was agreed that the next step would be the appointment of an Agenda Committee to prepare the Discussion Outline for the Small Group Sessions. Fifty-eight members from 30 Institutes had volunteered to serve in these Groups, which have been divided into (2) English-Speaking and (2) French-Speaking sections. (SEE APPENDIX "B" TO THIS REPORT).

b) As agreed at the Assembly Meeting of February 29, the Executive Committee appointed the following as members of the Agenda Committee, as well as Chairmen of their respective groups:

English-Speaking Group No. 1: Fr. E. Biggane sma, Chairman

c) The Executive Secretary was asked to arrange a meeting of the (4) Chairmen which Fr. Van Asten would also attend.

d) The Discussion Outline will take into consideration the points raised at the "Brainstorming" session (11 February 1972, SEDOS 72/138-140), the "Main Topics and Methodology of the Study"...Proposed by the Executive Committee for discussion at the 34th Assembly of Generals (SEDOS 72/141), and the results of such discussion by the Assembly (SEDOS 72/186 ff).

4. Agenda Item 4: Fr. Moody's request for clearance for coming issues of "Joint Venture":

a) It was agreed to accept Fr. Moody's suggestion that the central theme of the June issue be "Courses on Ongoing Formation in Mission Areas and in Home Countries"; for September, "Interfaith Dialogue", and for December, the "Annual Review".

b) It was also agreed that his suggestion for an issue devoted to "Communication in the Local Church" would be most useful at the conclusion of our on-going Study, "The Role of the Overseas Missionary in the Local Church".

c) The Executive Committee once again expressed appreciation for the creativity and dedication of Fr. Moody in rendering this important service.

a) The Executive Committee considered the letter dated 16 February 1972 from Sr. Barbara Hendricks mm and agreed to the proposal.

b) The Financial Statement for February was reviewed and it was decided that:

(3) Bro. Schnepf would meet with the Burser of the White Fathers to discuss the matter of interest on investments.

APPENDIX "A"

QUARTERLY REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

1. In the first quarter of 1972, the Secretariat was progressively becoming more oriented towards servicing the (3) studies undertaken by the Sedos group in the following priority:

- a) "The Role of the Overseas Missionary in the Local Church".
- b) "The Urban Mission"
- c) The Survey and Evaluation of the Mission Today (Buhlmann/Tonna project)

In connection with the above, the following describes in part what was done:

a) "The Role of the Overseas Missionary in the Local Church"

i) A "brainstorming" session was organized and held February 11. A summary was made of the results. At the request of the Executive Committee, a working paper was compiled for the Assembly's discussion and approval at their February 29th meeting.

ii) Relevant documents have been collected -- and are being collected. Those considered of special importance have been published in the Weekly Bulletin -- i.e., Fr. A. Bundervoet's paper on the theological basis of the study (presented in French and translated into English), and a synthesis of some experts' views on the subject, titled "The Changing Image of Missionaries" (SEDOS 72/203 ff).

iii) The organization of the small Study Groups agreed on by the General Assembly is currently in process.

iv) Ways and means for obtaining "feedback" from the representatives of the local churches are being developed.

b) "The Urban Mission"

i) The Development Working Group has made considerable headway in recording the reactions of a number of General Councils on the points raised by the study -- especially in connection with the Working Paper prepared for the Working Group by the Executive Secretary, titled "Urbanization and Mission -- Mission to the Cities of the Third World".

ii) The Secretariat has made contact with the "People and Cities" Conference of Coventry and with AMECEA (which has an on-going study on the Urban Mission in East Africa).

iii) The Working Group is planning direct contacts with urban mission projects in Rome.

c) The Survey and Evaluation of the Mission Today (Buhlmann/Tonna)

i) A representative panel was organized to offer guidance on the first phase of the project. It met on January 31, 1972.

ii) The Executive Secretary is working on recording the current needs and trends of the Third World as they become known from the reports and studies of the United Nations and other Agencies.

iii) Fr. Buhlmann is collecting material on the theological and pastoral aspects of this study, and is working on the design of the book (which will be one of the products of the study).

2. The "Information Cooperative" -- for which the groundwork was laid during the latter part of 1971 -- was launched January 1, 1972. The responses to the first request for titles of new documents received at the member Generalates during January was very encouraging. A report analysing and summarizing the information received was published (SEDOS 72/181 and 182). Connected with this effort:

i) The Executive Secretary is reviewing the Sedos list of descriptors. It is probable that this list will be adopted by a number of Generalates to classify their missionary information by subject. The same descriptors could be used to code requests to the Secretariat for information by individual Generalates and by Sedos Groups. It seems that this will be the crucial issue of the months ahead: How to refine the system of supplying Generalates the information they really need.

ii) The "Formation Facilities" project has now been completed for Africa and will be published in the Bulletin at an early date.

iii) The "Community Card File" project is progressing, with approximately 3,000 out of an estimated 10,000 cards completed, identifying specific addresses of the presence of Sedos Members in Africa, Asia, Latin America and Oceania.

3. The regular services of the Secretariate have continued -- secretarial services to the General Assembly and the 3 meetings of the Executive Committee; the Weekly Bulletin; organizing and following up the meetings of the permanent Working Groups; and organizing special meetings (e.g. "Reorganizing Generalate Secretariat Systems") as needs become known, or as requests are received from member Institutes.

4. The Permanent Working Groups

a) Development Working Group

i) A new Chairman, Fr. J. Schotte cicm has been elected.

ii) As mentioned above, the Urban Mission project is making good progress.

iii) At the request of the Executive Committee, the Working Group is studying the feasibility of an evening course in coop praxis for ecclesiastical students in Rome.

b) Social Communications Working Group

i) Two meetings have been organized with experts Babin and Healey.

ii) Fr. Aguiló's manuscript on "Who's Who in Latin American Communications" has been presented. The Executive Secretary is currently negotiating publication terms.

c) Health Group

i) An open meeting was organized on the "Health of Missionaries" on Feb. 22.

ii) Plans are being considered for a seminar in November, 1972 on "Change in Health Care".

iii) Sr. A.M. de Vreede scmm-m represented the group at the CMC in Geneva on January 9, 1972.

d) China Group

i) The group is seeking to bring the Centres already at work for China the thinking and the services of the member Institutes.

ii) The group is promoting the establishment of a coordinating centre (for China projects) run by Chinese.

5. GENERAL

a) Two members resigned -- the CFX and the SDS -- and one Institute, the Holy Missionary Family (MSF) joined Sedos as "observers".

b) The means of obtaining legal status for Sedos are being explored.

c) At the request of the General Assembly in December, "Joint Venture" was reviewed by a special committee and the recommendations reported to them on Feb. 29 (SEDOS 72/135-137)

d) During the first quarter there were 20 visitors to SEDOS (members and non-members) who came to give, share or request information. These included:

THE CENTRAL EDUCATION OFFICE - ITS FACILITIES AND THEIR USE

(BROTHERS OF THE CHRISTIAN SCHOOLS - Via Aurelia 476 - ROME 00165)

The Central Education Office puts its materials (in pedagogy, education, teaching, catechesis, etc.) entirely at your use. It will be happy to receive you, to provide such information as is possible, to make recommendations and to give you what help it can in your research.

In order to make these services possible it asks your attention to the following:

a) You may use the facilities any time the CEO is open. The card index (in 3 languages), the use of which will have explained to you (it has certain purely local peculiarities), will tell you where the materials you seek are located.

b) You can save time and secure better service if you use the sheets provided for giving advance notice to the CEO. If you allow a couple of days, and indicate as precisely as possible the subject of your research, we can have the materials ready for you on the day you indicate. This service is obviously limited by the resources of the CEO.

c) These documents (periodicals, reports, dossiers, etc) are not, as a general rule to be removed from CEO premises.

d) The same goes for the books in the CEO library. However, in unusual cases, loans may be arranged for several days to those living at 476 Via Aurelia. Excluded from such an arrangement are general reference works, dictionaries, encyclopedias, etc.

These regulations have in mind the usual purposes behind all library regulations, i.e., to avoid loss (often of irreplaceable items), and to enable the CEO to have access to such materials in case of urgent need.

e) Works on education, teaching, catechesis, etc., in the General Library are available under the regulations which obtain there. However, many of these works were originally purchased by the CEO, and occasionally it seeks access to them. This may explain a possible request to you to return such a volume before you have finished using it.

f) The usual method of obtaining a document in the CEO is to fill out the cards available for this purpose and give them to one of the members of the CEO staff. (You will probably prefer that one who speaks your language, but preference establishes no obligation).

g) Documents you receive for your research can be reserved -- kept together -- for several successive occasions if you need several to complete your study. However, this service must be requested.

h) Forms for requesting the various services of the CEO are available there. They will also be available in the Lasallianum and in the CIL. Until a box can be provided at the entrance of the CEO, please deposit the completed forms in the postal box of the CEO.

DAYS AND HOURS

It is always best to phone the CEO - No. 59 - to know if it is open. Save yourself a trip!

In general the CEO is open every day from 9:30 to 12:45 and from 15:30 (3:30 PM) to 18:00 (6:00 PM). It is closed on Sundays, feast days, holidays and THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

Brother J. Robert Lane is usually in the CEO from 13:30 to 16:15 except on the above days of closure and on Saturday afternoons.

The CEO may be opened on one of the above days of closing if an appointment is made for that purpose. This will not be a general practice. Inquire first as to the possibility of such an arrangement for a given day. During the summer vacation, above all during the month of August, the above schedule does not always obtain.

The Sedos Development Work Group met at SEDOS on 13th March '72 at 4.PM.

From Sedos: Fr. Tonna and Ann Ashford

I. Report of last meeting (Bulletin 8 72/166)

Fr. Schotte had not stated that he would submit a paper on the pastoral situation in the Philippines, but that he would make available a copy of the sociological paper for study.

II. REPORTS ON OUTSTANDING ACTIVITIES

- 1) Meeting with Cardinal Malula - The Chairman reported that the Cardinal was willing to meet the group informally and a meeting could be arranged for the following week at the House of the Scheut Fathers. Awaiting further confirmation, the meeting was tentatively set for Tuesday - 21st March - from 4-6pm.
- 2) Visit with Indian Sisters - March 17th - Drafting of questions - The group were informed that two or three sisters would be willing to answer questions at the meeting. Suggestions were now invited.

- Could they give us the statistics on population in their slums?
- What are the major problems as they see them in their daily dealings?
Overcrowding? Drunkenness? Religious practice? Communist penetration?
- What is their work and how does it relate to these problems?
- Do they see their work as a 'pastoral d'ensemble' or part of one?

Bro. Vincent agreed to pass these questions to the sisters prior to the meeting. A proposal to invite Mr. Basil, involved in the evangelisation of Moslems in French bidonvilles, was considered premature at this stage.

It was arranged that the group should meet at Sedos at 3.30pm. March 17th, and travel together to the sisters' home.

- 3) Bibliography for the Study of the Urban Mission - See next page, item III.
- 4) Meeting with Fr. Heynes on Tilapia - Fr. Brossard reported that Fr. Heynes was expected back in Rome in mid-May and would confirm his return one month previous. It was agreed that non-Sedos members could also be invited to the meeting with Fr. Heynes.

III. DISCUSSION OF URBAN MISSION REPORTS FROM DIFFERENT GENERALATES

The Chairman commented on the variety and richness of the reports. The DWG was now able to draw on material from several generalates and would give them feedback for their reactions. He then asked each member to summarise briefly the main points in his report.

Follow-up Action: A synthesis would be prepared at the secretariate and distributed to each member of the DWG for discussion at the next group meeting (ref: Document III). A copy of the initial general questions, the summary and the group's feedback on it would then be sent to all other Sedos generalates. It was also suggested that the synthesis be sent to key points in Africa, Asia and Lat. America, eg. to bishops who have shown their interest in the urbanisation problem, so as to draw from their reactions and gain an extra stimulus.

Bibliography - Fr. Moody had prepared and brought along a bibliography based on research activities relative to Urban Pastoral Action. Purely medical or sociological material was not included. There were five parts: General - Africa - Asia - Lat.Am. - Near East and other. The main sources of material had been the CMC (WCC), Geneva, ICUIS, Chicago, and FAO. It was decided that this initial list could be typed out at the secretariate and circulated to the DWG members for study. Other titles could be added progressively.

IV. FR. COUTINHO'S PROPOSAL

- 1) Each member had already received a copy of the report of the Task Force on their meeting with Fr. Coutinho.
- 2) Fr. Coutinho had been invited to meet the group and was now present to explain further details: lecturers, duration of courses and curriculum. He was also able to satisfy the group as to the NEED for such a course in Rome. He said the deans of the Soc.Scs.Instits. of St.Th.Aquinas and the Angelicum Universities already had students interested in the course. Its OBJECTIVE, he said, was similar to the Antigonish movement. It aimed at priests already staying in Rome eg. working on a doctoral thesis, who could be encouraged to assume responsibility in cooperative work and to promote cooperative managers and workers in their own countries. Fr. Coutinho pointed out that though there were some (though limited) FACILITIES IN THE FIELD, there were no experts to teach: they would first have to be trained here and could then operate the field facilities.
The DWG were especially interested in the SCREENING PROCESS PRIORITIES. Father was able to assure them that first priority would be given to native clergy from the Third World already in Rome, though the idea of later accepting applicants directly from the field was not to be excluded.
- 3) The group agreed to recommend the project to Sedos Exec.Com. for moral sponsorship, provided that: - Sedos sit on the board of directors - the Institute did not become just another organism in the West for the Third World - and priority be given to students already in Rome.
It was also decided that a study be made of existing facilities in the field. Fr. Tonna informed the group that Sedos had already drawn up a list of Formation Facilities in Africa, to be published in the bulletin before Easter.

V. EVALUATION AND FURTHER PLANNING OF THE URBAN MISSION STUDY

The Chairman distributed a memorandum on this subject, but discussion was postponed due to lack of time.

VI. CONCLUSION OF MEETING

The Chairman closed the meeting after setting the date of the next meeting.
